Birdwatching Opportunities

AuSable and Manistee Rivers

- Numerous public access sites
- Canoe/kayak trips

Deward Watchable Wildlife Site

- Non-motorized area
- River system

Dyer Truck Trail

- Red Pine old growth area

Hanson Hills Recreation Area

- 35k of trails through rolling oak hills
- Walking or mountain biking trails

Hartwick Pines State Park

- Four trails with a total length of 7 miles
- 15 miles of mountain biking trails accessible to foot traffic
- 9,672 acre state park
- 49 acre tract of "Old Growth Pine Forest"
- 1 1/4 mile long paved trail
- 3 of the 4 trails have a self-guided, educational brochure
- Birdfeeding station and monitor at the Visitor Center
- Two lakes with easy access and floating docks
- Rolling hills to flat landscapes with a wide variety of forest types

Kirtland's Warbler Tours

- Michigan's world-famous endangered songbird - the rarest Warbler in North America.
- Guided tours are conducted by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) in partnership with the Michigan Audubon Society from mid-May to the first week in July
- All tours are guided by expert wildlife professionals
- Reservations required for groups of five or more
- Free tours depart from the Grayling Holiday Inn at 7:00am & 11:00am daily

Mason Tract Pathway

- 11 1/3 miles of trails along the AuSable River
- Mixture of hardwood/Jack Pine and river system
- No biking/non-motorized area

Rayburn Property

- Paved hiking/biking trail leads to the AuSable River
- 2 miles of trail
- Jack Pine & Oak/river system

Wakeley Lake Quiet Area

- Foot travel area designed for the protection and restoration of threatened loons and eagles
- Loon nesting area March 1 to July 15
- Numerous species at and around the lake
- Open year round
- 16.5 miles of hiking & biking trails

W.J. Beal Plantation

- 40 species of trees
- Short rustic trail
